Continuing to drive Australian sport forward is at the heart of everything we do at the Australian Sports Commission.

We want to bring out the best in everyone involved in sport because that's how we will become the world's best – by working together and bound by a common purpose.

We encourage and help Australians of all backgrounds, ages and abilities to get involved in sport and we advocate for sport and the positive influence it has on the nation.

As we look towards next year's Milano Cortina Winter Olympic and Paralympic Games, the Glasgow Commonwealth Games, Los Angeles 2028 and Brisbane 2032, our vision is for sport to be safe, fair, accessible and inclusive.

The AIS Podium Project will deliver three new facilities, including a new multi-story and para-accessible accommodation, a Testing and Training Centre and indoor Sport Dome.

Construction will commence later this year with the AIS Podium Project being the first stage in delivery of the broader AIS Campus Masterplan – the ASC's long-term vision to ensure the AIS Campus continues to evolve as Australia's world leading high performance sport precinct.

As Australian high-performance sport continues to win well and build sustainable success towards Brisbane 2032 and beyond, we're also addressing the barriers people tell us they face participating in sport so all Australians that want to be involved can be involved in sport. This is how we will play well.

I know success will be greatest when every part of the system is able to perform their role at their best and I'm confident that the actions we take now will create a lasting legacy for Australian sport that will benefit us all for years to come.

BOARD AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT

A MESSAGE FROM THE SHOOTING AUSTRALIA CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER – ADAM SACHS ON BEHALF OF THE BOARD

On behalf of the Board, I am pleased to provide this report on Shooting Australia's (SA) operations for 2025.

Over the past 12 months, SA has focussed its people and resources on successfully navigating the transition from the Paris 2024 to the Los Angeles (LA) 2028 Olympic and Paralympic cycles. At the centre of this work has been the development of SA's LA 2028+ High Performance Strategic Plan and conversations with the Australian Sports Commission (ASC) and Australian Institute of Sport (AIS) regarding the Federal Government investment required to bring this strategy to life.

In December 2024, the ASC confirmed funding for Shooting of nearly \$3.5M per annum to deliver programs and initiatives that will:

- Optimise Shooting's contribution to Australia's success at the LA 2028 Games; and
- Support the continuing development of athletes and coaches towards qualification and success at the Brisbane (BNE) 2032 'home' Olympics and Paralympics.

This investment represents a slight increase in the funding provided to Shooting during the period 2021-2024 and reflects the ASC/AIS' confidence in SA's ability to lead our sport through

the challenges and opportunities that will emerge for Shooting, both domestically and internationally, and the Australian sports system in the coming years. On behalf of our athletes, staff and shooting community, SA's Board and I are very grateful for the ASC and AIS' tremendous support under their 'Win Well' and 'Play Well' strategies respectively.

This confirmation of funding has also enabled SA to progress the development of an 8-year budget forecast that aligns the organisation's financial resources with strategic priorities in the current cycle and extends through to BNE 2032. Priorities for the allocation of these resources will continue to be the:

- Efficient and effective delivery of SA's operations including the engagement of its highly skilled and dedicated workforce;
- Selection, preparation and performance of National Teams in international competitions;
- Development and delivery of enhanced daily performance environments for athletes identified as members of SA's National Squads;
- Engagement and development of more and better coaching and performance support (including through the National Institute



- Network (NIN)) to underpin athlete pathways and progressions; and
- Planning and implementation of a comprehensive SA Endorsed Domestic Event program that will underpin the progression of athletes and coaches and build the number and capability of event officials through LA 2028 towards BNE 2032.

SA's Board has maintained its close strategic oversight and direction of SA's operations and finances, and continues to deliver its responsibilities with professionalism, transparency, integrity and accountability. The Board is also continuing to evolve its membership and practices in response to the changing demands of SA's operating environment. This includes the need for SA's governance to align with the ASC's Sport Governance Standards, which is a condition of SA's Federal Government funding. Further details of this are provided later in this report.

As CEO, I would like to extend my sincere thanks to SA Board Directors for their leadership and support. And the Board and I would like to offer a special acknowledgment to former President, Andrew Sims, who resigned from his position (for personal reasons) in February 2025. Andrew served on the Board for almost 9 years and stepped in to the President's role shortly after the Tokyo 2021 Games.

Andrew's leadership out of the COVID-19 pandemic and through an intense 3-year Olympic/Paralympic cycle provided the foundations for SA's success in Paris 2024 and beyond.

Beyond the Boardroom, Australians are also contributing significantly to the good governance and strategic direction of world shooting through strong partnerships with the International Shooting Sport Federation (ISSF) and World Shooting Para Sport (WSPS). ISSF Vice President, Cath Fettel, and I continue to sit on the ISSF Executive Committee and advocate strongly for the Oceania region. This has included the establishment of strong connections between the ISSF and key stakeholders in the 2032 Olympics/Paralympics with the aim that shooting within Australia and across Oceania will benefit from a 'home Games' before, during and afterwards.

Finally, and on behalf of the Board, I would like to offer SA's sincere thanks to all our partners:

- The Federal Government through ASC and AIS as our principal investor and program partners;
- Shooting's Games delivery partners the Australian Olympic Committee (AOC), Paralympics Australia (PA) and Commonwealth Games Australia (CGA);

- SA's national Member Organisations (MOs); the Australian Clay Target Association (ACTA), National Rifle Association of Australia (NRAA), Sporting Clays Australia (SCA), Target Pistol Australia (TPA) and Target Rifle Australia (TRA);

- Our tireless team of passionate and incredibly hard-working staff; and most importantly ...

- Australia's best shooting athletes who continue to dedicate themselves to representing us all with pride and excellence on the world stage and in the process, inspire us and all Australians.

SHOOTING AUSTRALIA HIGH PERFORMANCE PROGRAM REPORT

ADAM SACHS - CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

In 2025, SA progressed a range of activities and initiatives that aligned with its LA 2028+ HP Strategic Plan and which set the foundations for Shooting's success at the next Olympic and Paralympic Games three years from now. These included ...

Re-Alignment of National Programs

Following a comprehensive review of its HP Program structure in the Paris 2024 cycle, SA undertook a restructure of its national programs to better align them with the organisation's strategic priorities, and human and financial resources moving forward. This resulted in:

- A stand-alone Shotgun Performance Program that supports current world-class athletes and provides increased support for developing HP athletes identified through the AIS' Athlete Categorisation process.

The Shotgun Program is led by Manager, Adam Hosking, and Performance Coach, Renae Birgan, who are responsible for planning and delivering activities and initiatives that will enable athletes to plan and explore their performance potential both within and across their daily performance and competition environments.

The Victorian Institute of Sport (VIS) continues to partner with SA in the delivery of its Melbourne-based Shotgun Program and is providing

athletes and coaches with access to world-class performance support on and off the range;

- A new Precision Performance Program that combines SA's previous Pistol, Rifle and Para national programs. This Program is led by Program Manager and Para Lead, Catherine Berry, and Senior Performance Coach, Petr Kurka, and will support the performance progression of both para and able-bodied athletes from Pistol and Rifle.

The Precision Program brings athletes and coaches from around Australia together through camps delivered in Adelaide and Brisbane-based 'performance hubs'. SA is also planning to utilise the facilities, services and expertise at the AIS in Canberra to support athlete and coach learning and development.

A key focus of the Precision Program is the identification and development of new para-shooting athletes as part of the Australian sports system's Para Uplift.

The Shotgun and Precision Performance Programs and staff have continued to underpin the preparation and performance of SA's National Teams to ISSF and WSPS competitions.

National Squads and Athlete Categorisation

SA selected fifty athletes to its National Squad in 2025. Para and able-bodied athletes were identified as members of either 'senior performance' or 'junior pathways' groups, and the number of juniors was increased significantly to reflect SA's commitment to building depth in the cohort of athletes that will likely underpin Australia's qualification for and success at the BNE 2032 Games.

Of these fifty National Squad members, nineteen met the criteria for Athlete Categorisation with the AIS at the following tiers:

- Podium – 1
- Podium Ready – 3;
- Podium Potential – 5;
- Developing – 4; and
- Emerging – 6.

Shooting's categorised athletes received priority access to performance support through the NIN, including the VIS for Shotgun. They were also prioritised for National Team selection to ISSF, WSPS and other events that SA's Performance Coaches believed would enhance their development and improve their international competitiveness, now and in the future.



SA's investment in categorised athletes was increased in 2025 and included:

- Fully funded travel to international competitions, which for many athletes was considerable; and
- Direct funding to athletes under SA's Categorised Athlete Support (CAS) scheme at the following levels (i.e. per athlete):
 - Podium – \$70,000;
 - Podium Ready – \$50,000;
 - Podium Potential – \$20,000;
 - Developing – \$10,000; and
 - Emerging – \$5,000.

Collectively, this investment made Shooting's athletes some of the best-supported in the Australian sports system.

National Team Selection and Performance

In early 2025, SA's national MOs were asked to nominate representatives from their respective discipline to sit on SA's Selection Panel. These representatives were subsequently approved by SA's Board and include:

- Rifle – Trcia Van Nus;
- Pistol – Ray Andrews; and
- Shotgun – Shane Pinner.

The Panel plays a critical role in the development and application of SA's selection criteria for National Teams to ISSF and WSPS competitions. A full list of international events and the Australian athletes that represented SA is provided later in this report. However, there are several significant performances that should be acknowledged including:

■ Para - Rifle

- Natalie Smith – Finalist (R6) and silver medallist (R8) at 2025 World Cup Changwon;
- Anton Zappelli – Finalist (R3 and R6) at 2025 World Cup Changwon; and
- R6 Mixed Team – Gold medal at World Cup Changwon (Scottie Brydon, Natalie Smith, Anton Zappelli).

• Rifle – 10m Air Rifle

- Jack Rossiter – Finalist at 2025 World Cups Buenos Aires and Munich, and bronze medallist at 2025 Grand Prix Ruse.

■ Shotgun - Trap

- Kiara Dean – Finalist at 2025 World Cup Lima;
- Mitchell Iles – Finalist at 2025 World Cup Buenos Aires;
- Laetisha Scanlan – Gold medallist at World Cup Lonato;
- Penny Smith – Finalist at 2025 World Cup Lima and gold medallist at 2025 World Cup Buenos Aires;
- James Willett – Finalist at 2024 World Cup Final (New Delhi); and
- Trap Mixed Team – Gold medal at 2025 World Cup Lima (Mitchell Iles, Penny Smith), gold medal at 2025 World Cup Lonato (Mitchell Iles, Laetisha Scanlan), silver medal at World Cup Buenos Aires (Mitchell Iles, Penny Smith); and

SA would like to extend its warmest congratulations to these athletes for their achievements.



LA 2028 Campaign Planning

2025 saw the International Olympic and Paralympic Committees (IOC and IPC respectively) confirm Shooting on the competition programs for the LA 2028 Games. And whilst Paralympic Shooting quotas were reduced by ten, there were no changes to the Shooting disciplines or events that would be contested in LA. Further information about how athletes and national federations can secure Games quotas will likely be released by the IOC/ISSF and IPC/WSPS in early 2026 ahead of the start of Olympic/Paralympic qualification later in 2026.

The AOC and PA have also begun their reconnaissance and planning for the LA 2028 Games and have started to share this information with national sporting organisations (NSO) including SA. This information, combined with key insights and learnings from our Paris 2024 debrief(s), has enabled SA to commence the development of Shooting's LA 2028 Campaign Plans, which will need to address important and/or unique factors including:

- Shooting competitions for Shotgun and Pistol/Rifle conducted in separate venues with significant distances between them;
- Pistol/Rifle competitions conducted in a fully enclosed venue that will only be accessible at Games time;

- Challenges around accommodation, accreditations and ground transport for Shooting's athletes and officials given the separation between competition venues.

Australia and Oceania may also be challenged by a reduction in Olympic quotas for LA 2028 on the back of pressure from Shooting's other continental confederations at the end of the Paris cycle. To this end, Oceania's representatives on the ISSF Executive Committee (i.e. Cath Fettell and Adam Sachs) have been working hard to address this with ISSF President, Luciano Rossi, through a series of meetings in 2025 that included his visit to Australia in February.

Shooting's AOC and PA-approved criteria for the nomination and selection of athletes to Australia's Olympic and Paralympic Teams will not be released until 2027.

Para Uplift - Shooting

In late 2024, the Federal Government announced a \$52M increase in funding for Paralympic sport(s) through a 'Para Uplift'. The new funding is intended to dramatically increase the capacity and capability of NSOs, the NIN and PA to identify, classify and develop more Para athletes and coaches in the lead up to the BNE 2032 Paralympic Games.

SA has committed itself to this objective through a range of new initiatives that have been (and will continue to be) delivered through its Precision Performance Program. These included:

- Shooting's engagement in a series of state-based talent identification sessions conducted by PA and state institutes and academies of sport. Clubs and state affiliates of SA's national MOs were also encouraged to be involved in these activities;
- A three-day talent transfer camp for former Para HP athletes who might be interested and show aptitude in Shooting. SA planned and delivered this camp in Canberra (CNB) with support from the AIS and the CNB National Pistol Club. Seven athletes (and their support people/animals where required) engaged in the camp with backgrounds in Archery, Athletics, Biathlon, Cycling, Power Lifting and Shooting; and



- A Trans-Tasman Para Shooting camp and competition conducted in BNE in conjunction with one of SA's 2025 Endorsed Domestic Events. During these activities, current and future Para athletes from Australia and New Zealand collaborate with and compete against one another.

Additionally in 2025, SA has increased the number of opportunities for prospective Para athletes to gain both provisional and national classification and has invested significantly in the Para-specific education of both coaches and event officials (detailed later in this report).

Athlete Development Framework

SA has also continued to lead the collection and documentation of information that will form Shooting's Athlete Development Framework (ADF). With significant input from SA's Performance Coaches, and experts from the AIS and across the NIN, SA's ADF will provide aspiring HP athletes and their coaches with a 'road map' to support their progression from beginner to elite.

The ADF will clearly articulate the stages of progression and key competencies that athletes are required to master at each stage of their development, across areas such as physical preparation, technical and tactical development, mental performance, etc. The ADF will also serve as a key component of the curriculum for SA's current and future program delivery in HP coach development.

HP Coach Development

From 2025, SA has significantly increased its focus on and investment into the identification and development of current and future cycle coaches, in line with its LA 2028+ HP Strategic Plan.

Coach Development Lead, Aurelie Gibson, has been charged with responsibility for planning and



delivering a range of initiatives that will complement coach education programs traditionally provided by SA's MOs. These will include:

- Improved access to and engagement in existing learning opportunities provided by the ASC Community Coaching group and ISSF Coach Academy;
- Establishment and implementation of a new 12-month, immersive Coach Development Program that will be piloted from November 2025 and connect experts from across the NIN with coaches of athletes being supported by SA's HP Program; and
- Continuing professional development of SA's Performance Program and National Team coaches through participation in targeted learning opportunities provided by the AIS (e.g. Gen 32 Coach Program, Women's Talent Coach Program, Para Coach Experiential Learning Program, etc.).

Collectively, these programs and initiatives are intended to increase the depth and quality of talented coaches at every level of Shooting's performance pathway. Appropriate access to high-quality coaching will be a prerequisite to Australia's best athletes being successful at the LA 2028 and BNE 2032 Olympic/Paralympic Games and beyond.

SHOOTING AUSTRALIA OPERATIONS REPORT

JENNI THOM - SHOOTING AUSTRALIA CHIEF OPERATING OFFICER

Board & Governance

Over the past year, SA has been working to update its constitution so that it meets the Sport Governance Standards set by the ASC. These changes are designed to strengthen how the organisation is run and to make sure we follow best practice in sports governance.

The key changes include:

■ Board Size and Structure:

Our Board will now include four (4) elected members and up to four (4) appointed members. The ASC recommends that Boards have seven or eight members in total, with at least 40% being appointed Directors.

■ Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI):

We are committed to having a Board that reflects a balance of genders. No one gender will make up more than 50% of our Directors.

■ Committees:

The new constitution now formally includes two key committees – a Nominations Committee and a Finance and Audit Committee. Each of these committees will have an independent chair appointed by the Board.

In line with recent updates to the Board structure, governance processes, and constitutional changes, SA is pleased

to announce new appointments to key committee leadership roles:

■ Russell D'Costa has kindly taken on the role of Chair of the Nominations Committee.

■ Jarrod Thorn, who has been a valued member of the Finance and Audit Committee for more than five years, has now stepped into the role of Chair of the Finance and Audit Committee.

We thank both Russell and Jarrod for their continued commitment and leadership.

The Nominations Committee has also been busy reviewing and recommending candidates for appointment to the Board. The Committee carefully considers each applicant's skills, experience, and alignment with the Board Skills Matrix, which includes a focus on diversity, equity, and inclusion.

After a thorough process that included interviews and reference checks, the Committee recommended two outstanding candidates to join the SA Board. Both have accepted and officially commenced as Appointed Directors in 2025:

■ Scott Houston, who previously supported SA as Chair of the Nominations Committee.



■ Alex Hammett, who brings valuable experience and fresh perspectives to the Board.

We welcome Scott and Alex and look forward to their contributions as we continue to strengthen the governance and leadership into the future.

Performance Support Staff Engagement

Chief Medical Officer

SA is pleased to welcome Dr James Ilic as the new Chief Medical Officer. Dr Ilic is a Sports Doctor based in Adelaide with lots of experience helping athletes in many different sports. We're excited to have him on board — thank you, Dr Ilic!

Travelling Team Staff

At the start of 2025, SA sought Expressions of Interest from individuals who were interested in playing a role as part of Travelling Team Staff to support athletes to international competitions. There was a great response from the target shooting community and beyond and during 2025, SA engaged eight individuals in coaching roles to support National Teams, including Tom Turner, George Barton, Suzy Balogh, Craig Bentley, Ben Sandstrom, Elise Collier, Steve Blackburn and Jeff Richardson.

Integrity Management

During the year, SA appointed Sports Advisory Partners Australia (SAPA) as its Integrity Manager. SAPA also works with other organisations in the shooting community, including Target Rifle Australia (TRA), the National Rifle Association of Australia (NRAA), and the Australian Clay Target Association (ACTA), to help them manage integrity matters.

Instead of hiring its own full-time integrity officer, SA now draws on SAPA's team of specialists. This gives SA and its MOs access to a broad range of skills and experience to handle integrity issues as they arise.

Working with an independent expert like SAPA ensures that all integrity matters are managed fairly, consistently, and in line with the National Integrity Framework.

This shared approach has already proven valuable, providing strong, independent advice and practical support when needed. The model has improved coordination across the shooting community and ensured that integrity issues are handled efficiently and professionally. Overall, the partnership with SAPA is working well and delivering clear benefits to SA and its member bodies.



SHOOTING AUSTRALIA SPORT DEVELOPMENT REPORT

**JANE VELLA - SPORT DEVELOPMENT, EVENTS
AND COMMUNICATION MANAGER**

The sport development initiatives that SA has been fortunate to facilitate during FY25 have predominantly been possible through the ASC's 'Play Well' Sport Development Strategy and associated investment in Sport.

Officiating Scholarship Program

SA continued its Officiating Scholarship program for the third consecutive year during FY25. 7 enthusiastic and ambitious officials were included in the program across the Pistol, Rifle and Shotgun disciplines. Each scholarship recipient was supported with further learning and development opportunities and were able to travel to at least three domestic SA Endorsed Events around Australia to apply their learning in designated officiating roles.

Through this program, SA engaged three experienced officiating mentors, one for each discipline, who worked closely with both the scholarship recipients and the broader officiating group to support and enhance their learning and development.

Officiating Opportunities

SA supported a number of officials to attend international officiating opportunities outside of Australia including to both ISSF and WSPS competitions. This included appointments to World Cups in Korea, Italy and China.

SA is continuing to work closely with the ISSF and WSPS to enable international officiating opportunities for Australian officials and nominated officials for roles at competitions in 2026. When opportunity presents, SA will also work closely with Local Organising Committees for any additional opportunities.

SA will continue to invest in the development of officials through both domestic Endorsed Events, and international competition opportunities, with a focus on the identification and development of a prospective Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic officiating workforce.

Coaching Development Program

FY25 has seen the development of a Coaching Development Program. This pilot, and first of its kind national program, is set to launch late in the year and across the 12 month duration will aim to enhance the key learnings and development of coaches in Pistol, Rifle and Shotgun, incorporating both



able bodied and para disciplines, through realistic applications within ISSF and WSPS.

This program will consist of camp, competition and online learning, as well as developing a Community of Practice (CoP) within the coaching community.

The Expression of Interest process for travelling team staff was valuable in identifying prospective participants for the coaching program.

SA Domestic Endorsed Events

The annual SA Domestic Endorsed Event Series continues to be an integral part of sport development. Significant time and effort is injected into the collaborative planning and delivery of the series from SA, MOs, State Associations and Clubs.

Athletes are able to access high-quality domestic competitions through the Endorsed Event Program that translates into varying things for different athletes, dependent on their stage of development in ISSF or WSPS disciplines. The domestic events are also used as a platform for the selection of athletes to National Teams.

Alongside high-quality competition opportunities for athletes across ISSF and WSPS disciplines, the domestic events enable development



opportunities for officials and volunteers, as well as for the event hosts.

Officiating Education

SA continues to encourage the further education of officials and in January, in conjunction with WSPS, hosted an international officiating course led by international course instructor Ferrol van Hoeven (Netherlands). This course was attended by 17 participants that included representation from most states and territories across Australia as well as attendees from New Zealand, and with a small number of Australian officials having their international WSPS officiating licences, this proved an invaluable opportunity.

SA is increasing the accreditation, licensing and educational opportunities across both ISSF and WSPS as we continue to encourage inclusion and integration through the Domestic Endorsed Events space, while increasing officiating capacity across both ISSF and WSPS in the lead up to Brisbane 2032.

SA, in conjunction with the Officiating Scholarship Mentors, has also provided additional education for officials through domestic events which has included equipment control, and RTS (results, timing, scoring).

Looking ahead to 2026 and SA will continue to create opportunities for officials including in SIUS electronic target system operations and EST national and international accreditation.

Member Organisation Engagement

SA maintains regular engagement with MOs through formal and informal meetings. SA ensures that MOs are well informed about sport development activities and the people and/or clubs that may represent their membership. Working together is an integral part of sport development activity execution and success.

International Events

During the period post the 2024 Olympic and Paralympic Games to July 2025, Australian shooting athletes were selected to 14 National Teams to compete at international events that included World Cups, Grands Prix and World Championships, capturing senior and junior, able bodied and para-athletes. 50 individual athletes represented Australia in the ISSF and WSPS disciplines and competitions, across 179 starts.

While some of the most experienced Australian athletes were selected to compete overseas, there were also international competition opportunities provided to junior and developing athletes via either a selection process (in accordance with selection criteria) or by opting in.

In the eleven-month period ending July 2025, the Australian Team who were selected to compete in ISSF events overseas, had the following successes:

DOMESTIC ENDORSED EVENTS

The Domestic Endorsed Events in 2025 were once again an integral component of the HP program. The 2025 SA Endorsed Event Series comprised 28 events across the Pistol and Rifle and Shotgun disciplines, incorporating both ISSF and WSPS.

The 2025 SA Endorsed Event Series once again saw SA partner with Event Hosts (including MOs, State Associations and Clubs) to deliver events that provided a platform to encourage greater competition participation in ISSF and WSPS disciplines. The domestic event series offers athletes a unique, inclusive and integrated opportunity to participate in a national domestic series of Endorsed Events, while welcoming all athletes irrespective of their age, gender or ability.

Throughout the 2025 SA Endorsed Event Series, athletes had access to a multitude of opportunities across Australia to compete in high-quality domestic competitions. These competitions also created opportunities for training platforms for National Team members (athletes who have been selected to compete in an international competition), an opportunity to show progression in results that supports consideration for Athlete Categorisation and/or selection to National Teams, or a pathway into ISSF or WSPS equivalent competitions from a non-ISSF or WSPS target shooting sport discipline.

The five primary objectives for the 2025 domestic event series were:

- a) National team selection - Some of the events within the 2025 Shooting Australia Endorsed Event Series were identified as events that will be used for National Team selection.



- b) National Squad and Athlete Categorisation - Results achieved within the 2025 Shooting Australia Endorsed Event Series may be considered to support the selection of an athlete to the National Squad and categorisation of an athlete in 2026.
- c) Average Performance Score – Domestic opportunities for athletes to record a performance score that will contribute to their Average Performance Score that may be used as a mechanism to monitor athlete development and progression to determine eligibility for selection to the National Squad and/or National Teams.
- d) Officials and Volunteers – Provide opportunities for individuals to remain active in officiating at domestic events, become active in officiating, receive mentoring and experience as part of SA's Officiating Scholarship Program, have a pathway to international officiating.
- e) Para Integration – Provide greater opportunity and support for the integration of Para-Shooting in domestic events for athletes, event hosts, officials and volunteers.

The large number of Endorsed Events on the 2025 program would not have been possible without the dedication and passion shown by the Event Hosts, Officials and volunteers, and the athletes that enter and compete. SA is extremely thankful and appreciative for the collective efforts and looks forward to the continuation and further development of this program in 2026.

DANE SAMPSON RETIREMENT

During the Rifle program awards, Dane Sampson's retirement from international competition was also acknowledged with a special presentation.

Dane began rifle shooting at age 12, later fulfilling his childhood dream of attending the Olympics, competing in the London 2012 Games.

A testament to his unwavering persistence and dedication to his sport, Sampson made four consecutive Olympic appearances, one of only twelve Olympians at the Paris 2024 games to represent Australia at four separate Olympic Games. He represented Australia at two Commonwealth Games, including the 2018 Gold Coast Commonwealth Games, where he won a gold medal in the Men's 10m Air Rifle competition.



SHOOTING AUSTRALIA FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE OVERVIEW

JENNI THOM

SA's main focus continues to be HP, supporting the athletes to compete at the highest level. Most of the spending goes toward meeting the requirements of the High Performance grant funding we receive from the ASC.

We record HP funding in line with the expenses it covers, and any unused funds are carried forward to be used in future periods.

During the year, SA carefully invested funds received in advance to earn additional interest income. Together with other non-ASC income, this resulted in a net profit of \$185,197 for FY25, increasing the retained earnings to \$913,208.

During the 2025 financial year, SA received funding from the ASC to support its programs. This funding covered both the final six months of the Paris Olympic cycle and the first six months of the LA Olympic cycle.

In December 2025, SA was provided with confirmed funding amounts through to 30 June 2026. The funding was aligned to the Win Well and Play Well National Strategies. This funding was divided between the Olympic, Paralympic and Play Well (Sport Development) programs.

During FY25, SA received the following grant funding:

- \$3.47m from AIS for the Olympic (able) program
- \$630,000 from AIS for the Paralympic (para) program
- \$375,000 from ASC for Play Well (Sport Development) program
- \$39,046 from South Australia Sports Institute (SASI)

\$18,916 from Commonwealth Games Australia

We have also worked closely with the ASC and the AIS to develop a financial forecast through to the Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games.

This long-term plan aligns with its LA 2028 + High Performance Strategic Plan and ensures we are building the financial capacity to host international competitions and deliver on its goals in the lead-up to both LA 2028 and Brisbane 2032.

FY25 has been an important year for securing funding through to 30 June 2026 and for budgeting beyond that period. The long-term financial model provides a clear pathway to manage the resources effectively and support the High Performance Strategy all the way to Brisbane 2032.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2025

The financial report covers Australian International Shooting Ltd as an individual entity. Australian International Shooting Ltd is a not-for-profit Company limited by guarantee, incorporated and domiciled in Australia.

The functional and presentation currency of Australian International Shooting Ltd is Australian dollars.

Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated.

1. BASIS OF PREPARATION

In the Directors opinion, the Company is not a reporting entity since there are unlikely to exist users of the financial statements who are not able to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy specifically all of their information needs. This special purpose financial report has been prepared to meet the reporting requirements of the Corporations Act 2001.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements of the Australian Accounting Standards and Accounting Interpretations, and the disclosure requirements of AASB 101 *Presentation of Financial Statements*, AASB 107 *Statement of Cash Flows*, AASB 108 *Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors* and AASB 1054 *Australian Additional Disclosures*.

2. MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICY INFORMATION

(a) Revenue and other income

When the Company receives operating grant revenue, it assesses whether the contract is enforceable and has sufficiently specific performance obligations in accordance with AASB 15.

When both these conditions are satisfied, the Company:

- identifies each performance obligation relating to the grant
- recognises its obligations under the agreement as income in advance
- recognises revenue as it satisfies its performance obligations.

Where the contract is not enforceable or does not have sufficiently specific performance obligations, the Company:

- recognises the asset received in accordance with the recognition requirements of other applicable accounting standards (e.g. AASB 9, AASB 16, AASB 116 and AASB 138);
- recognises related amounts (being contributions by owners, lease liability, financial instruments, provisions, revenue or contract liability arising from a contract with a customer); and
- recognises income immediately in profit or loss as the difference between the initial carrying amount of the asset and the related amount.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

Operating grant revenue exceeded expenditure in the period. The unspent operating grant revenue has been recognised as income in advance.

The Company's operating grant revenue met the conditions noted above.

The Company's operating grant revenue is predominately received from the Australian Sports Commission (ASC) and primarily relates to the development of high performance athletes. Some of the grants received have more specific performance obligations (i.e. a specific dedicated purpose) as opposed to the main high performance funding that is received from ASC. Funding related to these grants is only recognised as revenue to the extent of the expenditure incurred in relation to those grants, and the balances are carried forward as income in advance.

FINANCIAL REPORT

The Company continues to maintain active and constructive dialogue with the Australian Sports Commission (ASC) regarding the management of its federal government investment in alignment with its High Performance Strategic Plan.

As part of the Company's forward planning, and in consultation with the ASC, the Company has outlined its intention to host international events in Australia in the lead-up to the Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games. These events align with the Company's High Performance Strategic Plan.

The Company's other usual revenue sources comprise miscellaneous income from sponsorships and affiliations and periodic income from events. In line with its agreement with the ASC, the Company will retain and bank any surplus non-government funding or interest accrued. This approach is designed to strengthen the company's balance sheet and provide a financial buffer, enabling the Company to better manage and mitigate risks associated with the planning and delivery of international events.

(b) Leases

Lease assessment at contract inception

Right-of-use asset

At the lease commencement, the Company recognises a right-of-use asset and associated lease liability for the lease term. The lease term includes extension periods where the Company believes it is reasonably certain that the option will be exercised.

The right-of-use asset is measured using the cost model where cost on initial recognition comprises of the lease liability, initial direct costs, prepaid lease payments, estimated cost of removal and restoration less any lease incentives received.

The right-of-use asset is depreciated over the lease term on a straight line basis and assessed for impairment in accordance with the impairment of assets accounting policy.

Lease liability

The lease liability is initially measured at the present value of the remaining lease payments at the commencement of the lease. The discount rate is the rate implicit in the lease, however where this cannot be readily determined then the Company's incremental borrowing rate is used.

Subsequent to initial recognition, the lease liability is measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method. The lease liability is remeasured whether there is a lease modification, change in estimate of the lease term or index upon which the lease payments are based (e.g. CPI) or a change in the Company's assessment of lease term.

Where the lease liability is remeasured, the right-of-use asset is adjusted to reflect the remeasurement or is recorded in profit or loss if the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset has been reduced to zero.

Exceptions to lease accounting

The Company has elected to apply the exceptions to lease accounting for both short-term leases (i.e. leases

with a term of less than or equal to 12 months) and leases of low-value assets. The Company recognises the payments associated with these leases as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

(c) Property, plant and equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment.

Where the cost model is used, the asset is carried at its cost less any accumulated depreciation and any impairment losses. Costs include purchase price, other directly attributable costs and the initial estimate of the costs of dismantling and restoring the asset, where applicable.

Depreciation

Property, plant and equipment, excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a straight-line basis over the assets useful life to the Company, commencing when the asset is ready for use.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable asset are shown below:

(d) Financial instruments

Financial assets

All recognised financial assets are subsequently measured in their entirety at either amortised cost.

Classification

On initial recognition, the Company classifies its financial assets into the following categories, those measured at:

- amortised cost
- fair value through profit or loss - FVTPL

Amortised cost

The Company's financial assets measured at amortised cost comprise

trade and other receivables and cash and cash equivalents in the statement of financial position. trade and other receivables and cash and cash equivalents in the statement of financial position.

Financial assets through profit or loss

All financial assets not classified as measured at amortised cost as described above are measured at FVTPL.

Net gains or losses, including any interest or dividend income are recognised in profit or loss.

Impairment of financial assets

The Company uses the presumption that an asset which is more than 30 days past due has seen a significant increase in credit risk. Credit losses are measured as the present value of the difference between the cash flows due to the Company in accordance with the contract and the cash flows expected to be received. This is applied using a probability weighted approach.

Trade receivables

Impairment of trade receivables have been determined using the simplified approach in AASB 9 which uses an estimation of lifetime expected credit losses. The Company has determined the probability of non-payment of the receivable and multiplied this by the amount of the expected loss arising from default.

The amount of the impairment is recorded in a separate allowance account with the loss being recognised in finance expense. Once the receivable is determined to be uncollectable then the gross carrying amount is written off against the associated allowance.

Where the Company renegotiates the terms of trade receivables due from certain customers, the new expected cash flows are discounted at the original effective interest rate and any resulting difference to the carrying value is recognised in profit or loss.

Financial liabilities

The financial liabilities of the Company comprise trade payables, bank and other loans and lease liabilities.

(e) Impairment of non-financial assets

At the end of each reporting period the Company determines whether there is an evidence of an impairment indicator for non-financial assets. Where an indicator exists and regardless for indefinite life intangible assets and intangible assets not yet available for use, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated.

(f) Employee benefits

Employee benefits are presented as current liabilities in the statement of financial position if the Company does not have an unconditional right to defer settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting date regardless of the classification of the liability for measurement purposes under AASB 119 Employee Benefits.

In determining the liability for employee entitlements to long service leave, the Company is satisfied that based on past experience, the accrual of the Company's long service liability based on remuneration rates and on costs current at balance date for all employees with five or more completed years of service provides and estimate of the long service liability not materially different from the estimate determined using the present value basis of measurement.



MARSH INSURANCE REPORT

This report provides an overview of the sponsored income received by Australian International Shooting Ltd, trading as Shooting Australia, over the past twelve months. The data covers the period from September 2024 to September 2025 and includes a comparison with the previous three years.

As insurers continue to reassess their risk profiles and appetite, we are observing a reduction in available insurer options within this risk category. The most significant challenges remain in the property insurance market, which affects a broad range of risks and occupations. While Marsh has successfully secured a property insurance solution tailored for firearms clubs and associations, the uptake of this option has been slower than initially expected.

In addition to property insurance challenges, management liability risks have become an area of increased focus. There has been a notable rise in notifications related to suspended memberships and defamation claims within the shooting community. These developments highlight the importance of robust risk management practices and the need for comprehensive coverage to protect directors, officers, and the organisation against potential legal and reputational exposures. Marsh is actively monitoring these trends and will work closely with Shooting Australia to address these emerging risks through proactive risk mitigation strategies.

Marsh remains committed to collaborating with Shooting Australia to implement this program for the benefit of all MOs. We are also pleased to confirm the continuation of our partnership through a sponsorship agreement, which includes an annual contribution of \$20,000 from Marsh.
